A world-famous clarinet virtuoso with several pioneering record albums to his credit and an over 30-year legacy of performing and teaching as clarinet professor at Arizona State University, Robert Spring sits down to answer some questions.

What's the hardest part about being a musician? Practicing daily. I've done this since 1966!

What really makes you laugh?
Bad puns, and bad lessons when
you and your student just fall apart

What do you love most about your life right now? Freedom! I can perform any and all styles of music. I'm also old enough to do what I want in music and not care what others think.


How do you know when you're finished with a practice session?
